IN TODAY'S GOSPEL

What does God want for you during this Advent season? What does the Spirit want to do within and for you? What blessings await you? What grace and anointing will be poured out upon you?

We don't tend to think in this way, having learnt not to expect or hope for too much so that we won't be disappointed. However, this isn't a Christian way to think because Christians expect great things from God. Many centuries before Jesus came, the prophet Zephaniah said. 'The Lord God is with you. He is mighty to save. He will take great delight in you. He will quiet you with his love, he will rejoice over you with singing' This Advent. God wants to renew you in his love. We can anticipate and rely on the truth that this is what God wants for us. John the Baptist shows us how this renewal occurs: through repentance and turning away from sin. Of course, we can confess our sins to God on our own, but the best way to do this is through the sacrament of reconciliation; truly the sacrament of mercy and forgiveness.

It can be hard to acknowledge our sinfulness and weakness. It takes courage and a willingness to let God's light shine into the deepest and darkest parts of us. This can be a lonely and daunting journey, but God is with us. There is no sin that God cannot forgive. There is no sinner beyond his mercy and forgiveness. There is only grace, mercy and forgiveness as we are renewed in God's love. So don't be afraid: take courage and be assured of his love and mercy.

Our brokenness is the wound through which the full power of God can penetrate our being and transfigure us in God. Loneliness is not something from which we must flee but the place from where we can cry out to God, where God will find us and we can find God.

Yes, through our wounds the power of God can penetrate us and become like rivers of living water to irrigate the arid earth within us. Thus we may irrigate the arid earth of others, so that hope and love are reborn.' (Jean Vanier)

Welcome to all our parishioners and visitors to Our Sunday celebration of Mass.

We are now close to the great feast of Christmas, the birth of our Saviour. Every celebration of the Eucharist begins with a penitential prayer, the Confiteor, which means 'I confess or I acknowledge'. This short prayer is a humbling admission of our human condition. We could call it the 'Beggars Prayer' - an honest confession of our state before God and each other. It is applicable to everyone, Pope, Bishops, priests and people 'from Saint to sinner'.

True repentance involves action and change. For St. John the Baptist, repentance was tangible. Pray to the Holy Spirit to show us what we need to repent of and give us the grace to repent and change. True repentance requires words and deeds. 'The Lord is my strength, my song, he became my Saviour. (Isaiah 12:2).

As we heard from Our Bishop Alan, Our Holy Father called together the Church of God to embark on a Synod called 'A Synodal Church: Communion, Participation and Mission'. It is for all of us to express our dream of what kind of church we would love in the future. We would like to pray and support your listening sessions. After Mass on the First Sunday Of Advent we had coffee after Mass and it gave some of our parishioners the opportunity to write down their thoughts privately and hand them into our leader Mary Brooks. There is a parallel here with some of the feelings of Mary and St. Joseph that they may have experienced as they prepared to bring Jesus into this world. Advent is a fitting moment to embark on Our Journey Together. We all have a role to play as we try to discern God's call for his people.

Come Holy Spirit and fill us with your love as we try to respond to your call of Mission. Lord bless our Advent journey and open our hearts to be changed.

Honouring Sunday

As the Synodal Pathway of listening and discerning unfolds, we the bishops of England and Wales, are paying particular attention to the hopes and fears, the joys and anxieties of all who are sharing their thoughts and feelings with us.

RESPONDING TO THE GIFT

We now encourage all Catholics to look again at the patterns which they have formed in recent months with regard to going to Mass on Sundays. This would include consideration and reflection about what we might do on Sundays, such as sports or shopping, or other leisure and social activities. This review, and the decisions which arise from it, fall to every Catholic, and we trust this will be done with honesty, motivated by a real love for the Lord whom we encounter in the Mass. The Sunday Mass is the very heartbeat of the Church and of our personal life of faith. We gather on the "first day of the week," and devote ourselves to the apostles' teaching and the fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers (Acts 2:42). The Eucharist sustains us and spurs us on, renewing our gratitude and our hope. When we say "Amen" to Christ in receiving his Body and Blood, we express the love of God which is deep within us, and at the end of Mass, when we are sent forth, we express our love for our neighbour, especially those in need. These two dimensions reveal the full meaning of our faith. We are gathered together and sent out, we pray and are fed, we worship and we adore; these are intrinsic to our lives as those baptised into Christ.

Journey Together with the universal Church

Our Bishop's pastoral letter spoke about working to a Synodal pathway. He highlighted that we are united to a greater communion, participation, and mission. These are our calling as Catholic Christians.

- Listening to God's spoken word. We listen with the 'Ear of our heart' (St. Benedict). At the annunciation Mary listens to God through the Angel Gabriel. First we too must listen to God speaking to us – prayer, the reading and reflecting on his words.
- Participation Mary cared and went to see her cousin Elizabeth. She was attentive to the needs of her neighbours. We too are called to participate in the needs of our neighbours, whether it is giving time and love to our parish community that is sharing in the various ministries – readers, eucharistic ministers, altar servers, ushers/stewards, contacting sick, or parishioners in need etc.
- Our Mission is to make God known and loved in our world, i.e. living the Christian Catholic lives, caring and being aware of who we are in our words and actions with our families – and those we encounter in the world.

This is what we are asked to do, pray together, to talk with and listen to each other and to share our dreams for a future church in communion, participation and mission.

Confirmation 2022

If you wish to be confirmed next year, please give me in writing your name and contact details. You should be 14+. The preparation course begins in January 2022. Confirmation is the second sacrament where you will be anointed with the fullness of the Holy Spirit and his Gifts. By this anointing the confirmed receives to 'seal' or 'mark' of the Holy Spirit. A seal is a sign of authority or ownership of the object. Christ himself declared that he was marked with his father's seal. The seal of the Holy Spirit makes our total belonging to Christ, our enrolment in his service for ever, as well as promise of divine protection. In the prayer..."Send your Holy Spirit to be their helper and guide - give them the spirit of Wisdom and understanding, right judgement, courage, knowledge, reverence, spirit of wonder and Love".... I ask our parents to engage in conversation about the important sacrament offered to our young teenagers for their journey in life.

OR Codes

What are they and how do they work?

A QR (Quick Response) code works in the same way as a barcode at the supermarket. It is a machine-scannable image that can instantly be read using a Smartphone camera. Every QR code consists of a number of black squares and dots which represent certain pieces of information. In our instance, the QR code will take you directly to a website where you can make your donation digitally, instead of using cash. The Diocese is wanting ALL churches to use this form of giving to replace cash which is time consuming and expensive to count and check. Using the QR code enables the parish to save time and money – both of which are very welcome!

So please don't forget that if you normally donate cash weekly, then please use the QR codes which can be found on the back page of the newsletter each week. This helps to keep the money coming in while reducing the amount of cash that we have to count, double check and then take to the bank. And amazingly some banks have actually stopped taking cash! Thank you and God Bless.
