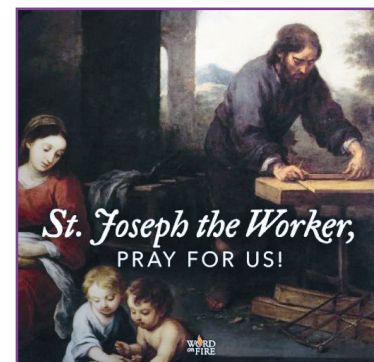

Welcome to all our friends and visitors to our Sunday Celebration.

I pray that in the coming weeks more of our parishioners will return to our Sunday Mass and even to our weekday Masses especially on Wednesday evening at 7.30 p.m.

Jesus died on the cross because He loved us, and His mercy is without end. Please find time to come to Him as we need his presence as we try to navigate the rough seas of life.

The people of the Old Testament experienced God’s love as they consoled and encouraged themselves with memories of what God had done, and what he’d promised to do: “But now memories belong to the generation of this life, (God’s) presence is the possession of the kingdom of heaven” (St. Bernard of Clairvaux, On Loving God).

It’s God’s Spirit alive in us who gives us the power and strength to love. St. Bernard describes four degrees of love: The first is loving for our own sake, because we see the futility of our lives, and proclaim we need God; the second arises as we turn to him often and become acquainted with his ways and begin to see how wonderful he is; the third is when we start to love God not out of selfish motives but for God’s sake; and fourth is where we love ourselves for the sake of God. This is the love of heaven. This is what we pray for when we say, “Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven”.

Fire Inspection

Recently we have had a fire inspection: Details can be had from parish administrator. Some important points –

Hall – All fire doors must have a long bar across them. The emergency lighting needs to be inspected at least one once a year. Outside door of the hall should be a fire door. Maximum attendance in the hall 150.

In the Church – No children to light candles - no crowding of people at any one time, when they had been lit. Fire Wardens need to be trained in what will be expected of them. Church doors all need to be unlocked.

When many people are gathered, a fire warden should be present. After a mass a practice run should be put in place.

Entrance to the school gates should be clearly marked as a fire exit and no parking. That’s just a few points to share with you.

Be ever watchful.

We do need urgently to form a choir in order to offer praise to God in Song. It is an important part of our liturgy and we have some very good voices. Please, please come forward and don’t leave it all to your priest. Thank you.

Journey Home Threshold of Hope – Please read each week - (Continued)

There are many important questions: what should I do with my life? What career path should I pursue? Should I marry or enter the religious life? What's the meaning of life? What happens after death? However, there's one question that's more important than every other, that sets the course of our life and needs to be answered daily: who do you say Jesus of Nazareth is? This was the question put to the disciples by Jesus and which Peter answered so decisively and clearly; the fruit, we learn, of the blessing and grace of the Holy Spirit. While still a young man, the tide of public opinion turned against him. His friends ran away. One of them denied him. Another turned traitor. He went through the mockery of a trial. He was nailed to a cross between two thieves. While he was dying, his executioners gambled for the only thing he owned on this earth – his clothing. When he was dead, he was laid in a borrowed grave through the pity of a friend and rose again on the third day. Twenty centuries have come and gone, and today he's the central figure of the human race and the leader of the column of progress.

Feast of the Passion of St John the Baptist

The Memorial of the Passion of Saint John the Baptist complements the Solemnity of his birth, celebrated on 24 June. John is the cousin of Jesus. He was conceived when his parents, Zechariah and Elizabeth, were elderly. Both his parents were descendants of priestly families. John's birth took place about six months prior to that of Christ, and coincides with the Gospel episode of the Visitation of Mary to Elizabeth. The liturgical celebration of his martyrdom, which occurred between 31 and 32, has ancient origins. It was already celebrated in France in the 5th century, and in Rome the following century and can be traced to the dedication of a small basilica that dates back to the 5th century where he was buried in Sabaste in Samaria. Tradition holds it was on this day that his head was found. Pope Innocent II had it later transferred to Rome to the Church of Saint Sylvester in Capite.
