



IN TODAY'S GOSPEL

Catholic social teaching has largely owned the Parable of the Good Samaritan and in a way rightly so, because it highlights the care and solicitude we owe every human being, particularly those in dire need physically, emotionally or spiritually. However, is there a deeper meaning to the parable?

We can be absolutely sure that because Scripture is divinely inspired, there is always a deeper meaning behind every verse. Some of the early Fathers, such as Origen or St. Augustine, as well as the mediaeval theologian St. Thomas Aquinas, discerned in this parable a much deeper meaning than just helping our neighbour. They approached the parable allegorically - in other words, as a device in which the characters or events in the parable represent or symbolize real people and events and communicate a hidden and profound message. Approaching Scripture allegorically can open up deeper and deeper layers of meaning.

Some theologians dislike this approach because they fear that we can read something into the text’s significance which the original author didn’t intend. But they often approach Scripture in the wrong way, studying and dissecting it like a Shakespeare play. Scripture is the divine Word of God and by its very nature there are always hidden depths to plumb.

So, for today, let us consider an allegorical understanding of the parable. Jerusalem represents heaven and Jericho represents the world. The robbers are the devil and his demons. The priest represents the Torah (the Jewish law) and the Levite represents the prophets. The victim beaten, bruised, wounded and left half-dead by the roadside is mankind. The Good Samaritan is Jesus, and the donkey is Christ’s body, bearing the weight of the broken body of the victim of this terrible robbery. Finally, the inn represents the Church, our place of healing and sanctuary. The Good Samaritan’s promise to return is a reference to Jesus’ Coming again in power and glory.

Lord, open my eyes, ears, and heart to understand the hidden depths of your Word so that I can be taught by the Spirit the riches and treasures contained in every letter, every word.


The message for us in today's readings tell us firstly we must love and seek the Law of God before everything else and everyone else. We must truly love and obey the Law of God with all our mind, and heart, and soul. Despite the necessities of life, let us remember and keep Sunday holy and fulfil our obligation to attend Mass and gladly participate in the praise and worship of the Lord with his Body, the church. Here we listen to God's word and receive the Body and Blood of Christ in commemoration of Our Lord's Last Supper. Secondly many of us treat the Law of God or the Ten Commandments as burdensome and hard to follow. However they teach us something practical for our daily lives. For instance, "You shall respect your father and mother. You shall not kill. You shall not steal. You shall not be envious of your neighbours and their possessions". Thirdly, often many of us claim ignorance or lack of understanding or human weakness for failing to follow God's law. But as Moses says, God has made it clear for all to see and understand what He wants from us. These commandments are essential for our well-being, peace and joy. Fourthly we must put them into action as Jesus said to the question "What must I do to inherit eternal life". "You shall love The Lord Your God, with all your heart, with all your being, with all your strength and with all your mind, and your neighbour as yourself".

All of us have been given the grace with the knowledge of good and evil by God. Let us pray that we receive His Word in faith and that He May give us the power to live the kind of life we are called to live. When we fail, we have the Sacrament of Confession to raise us up and renew our peace and joy.

I wish all our families the love and peace of Jesus.

Sea Sunday – 9/10 July 2022



Bishop Alan received a letter of thanks from Fr. Anthony Chantry, National Director of Missio for the 2021 collection from Brentwood Diocese which amounted to £154,218.00. These donations will go towards the Universal Solidarity Fund, which is distributed around the world to dioceses that are struggling and mission projects that benefit those in greatest need. 40% of the donations go to support the Mill Hill Missionaries working in 19 countries in Africa and Asia.

March For Life: 3 September

This year marks the sad milestone of 10 million abortions in the UK since the 1967 Abortion Act. It is more important than ever that all people of goodwill, and especially Catholics, give public witness to the infinite dignity of human life.

We can do so at the annual March for Life held on Saturday 3 September. Bishop Sherrington will celebrate Mass at 11.00 a.m. at St. George's Cathedral, Southwark. Priests are welcome to concelebrate. LifeFest22 is a pro-life, family-friendly festival held 10.30 a.m. - 1.30 p.m. at the Emmanuel Centre, Marsham Street SW1P 3DW. The March itself starts at the Emmanuel Centre at 2.00 p.m., proceeding to Parliament Square, where there will be testimony and speeches, with the day concluding at 4.30 p.m. More information can be found at <https://www.marchforlife.co.uk/>

Visiting the lonely elderly

The second World Day for Grandparents and the Elderly will be celebrated in a situation in which in many countries the health emergency has ended, which will allow initiatives to be taken with greater freedom and to put personal encounter and embrace at the center of each one. In order for the message of closeness and consolation that the Day wants to express to reach everyone - even those who are most isolated - we ask people to make a visit to their grandparents and the lonely elderly in their community and to deliver the Holy Father's message to them.

The visit, a tangible sign of the outgoing Church, is a way to reaffirm that the elderly, even the loneliest, are at the center of our communities.

The visit shows the personal choice to get up and go quickly to others (cf. Lk. 1:39), just as Mary did to visit the elderly Elizabeth.

The visit can be an opportunity to bring a gift, such as a flower, and to read the Day's prayer together.

Visiting a lonely elderly person is one of the possibilities for obtaining the Plenary Indulgence granted on the occasion of the Day.

The encounter between young and old, the friendship that can result, is one of the signs that "In old age they will still bear fruit."

Our Catholic Faith from Catechism of the Catholic Church

First Commandment

'You shall worship the Lord your God and him only shall you serve'

2084. God makes himself known by recalling his all powerful love and liberating action in the history of one he addresses. 'I brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of bondage.' The first word contains the first commandment of the law. 'You shall fear the Lord your God, you shall serve him. You shall not go after other Gods'. God's first call and first demand is that man accepts him and worship him.

2085. The one true God first reveals his glory to Israel. The revelation of the vocation and truth of man is linked to the revelation of God. Our vocation is to make God manifest by acting in conforming with his creator in the image and likeness of God.

The first commandment embraces faith, hope and charity. This commandment requires us to nourish and protect our faith and reject everything that opposes it.

Hope - we must hope that God will give us the capacity to love him in return and act in conformity with the commandment of charity.

Love - we are called to love God above everything and all creatures for him and because of him.

Therefore prayer is lifting up the mind towards God in an expression of our petition. Prayer is an indispensable condition for being able to obey God's commandments.
