Welcome to all our parishioners and our visitors, especially to all our young people who must be getting excited as Christmas draws near.

The birth of Jesus is now imminent. In a few days time, we shall be celebrating the memory of that great event. In today's gospel, Matthew provides us with the circumstances surrounding the Virgin Birth of Jesus. He also wants us to communicate a sense of how dramatic this divine action was.

There are three big personalities who dominate the Advent Season, namely Isaiah, John the Baptist and Mary. But suddenly today a fourth personality appears ever so briefly in the gospels and then disappears: St Joseph.

Matthew builds the story around the person of Joseph. Joseph is told not to be afraid to take Mary home as his wife. When Joseph finds out Mary is pregnant and he knows he is not the father, he undergoes a serious crisis. However, an angel in a dream tells Joseph not to be afraid; she has conceived through the Holy Spirit. For his part, Joseph is to be the husband of Mary and foster father of Jesus, God's son.

All this took to fulfil what the Lord had said through the prophet "Behold the Virgin shall be with child and bear a son and they shall name him Emmanuel which means God is with us". The effectiveness of that presence depends on our conscious union with Jesus and with the vision of His gospel lived out in our daily lives. Let Jesus be really re-born in each one of us this Christmas. The Lord wants to enter into our hearts. We should be like Joseph and Mary who put their total trust in divine providence. Let us pray for all Christians that they may prepare themselves for the coming of the Lord and welcome Jesus like Mary and Joseph, to receive his joy and peace.

May these last three days be a time of spiritual nourishment and may Christ the son of God, the Light of the world and the prince of peace at Christmas, be with each and everyone throughout the coming year.

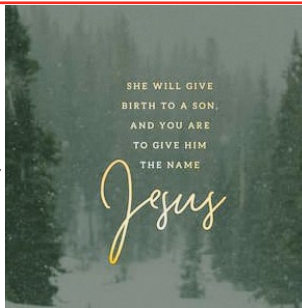
IN TODAY'S GOSPEL

Marriage in Israel took place in stages. There was engagement, betrothal and then the marriage. The betrothal was the point when the engagement became legal. It took a divorce to break it. Mary and Joseph were at the betrothal stage. On discovering that Mary was pregnant, only two possible scenarios could have presented themselves to Joseph - neither would have been the possibility of a virginal conception! He must have thought that his beloved Mary must either have been seduced (which was bad enough and a real wound) or, worse, that she had been violated and raped.

Matthew informs us that, as Joseph saw it, the only option available to him was to divorce her quietly. As a devout observer of the Torah (the Old Testament law) Joseph could not take Mary as his wife – the discovery of her pregnant state categorically prevented this and was against the law. The law was brutal and uncompromising regarding sexual infidelity and demanded the death penalty for both parties involved in the transgression.

We learn so much about Mary and Joseph from this situation. Mary was herself immaculately conceived and born without original sin. We learn that Joseph, a devout Jew, was rooted and grounded in love for Mary and acted in compassion towards her. Matthew tells us, “her husband Joseph, being a just man and unwilling to put her to shame, resolved to divorce her quietly”. Joseph protected Mary from the very beginning. Although Mary and Jesus are rightly the focus of the Christmas story, today we reflect on Joseph’s mature wisdom and holiness and his embrace of God’s plan of salvation. In a few days’ time we celebrate the birth of Jesus, but today we sing a hymn of praise and thanks to God for the gift of Joseph – the man of faith, the protector and servant of his beloved wife Mary and the child she bore in her womb.

Lord God and Father, today we give you thanks and praise for the witness of St. Joseph, who teaches us so much about how to respond to the Spirit and how to be obedient to God’s will whatever the cost, whatever the price.

There are two attitudes typical of lukewarm Christians: putting God in a corner - either you do this for me or I won't go to Church anymore - and washing our hands of those in need. Let us get rid of these attitudes to make space for the Lord who is coming.

Peace Sunday 19 January 2020

The Bishops of England and Wales invite us to keep this Sunday as a day of prayer for world peace and to reflect on the theme chosen by Pope Francis for the annual World Peace Day (yet to be announced). The day has a particular ‘flavour’ this year because we pass so many significant anniversaries in the coming months: the 75th anniversary of the liberation of Auschwitz, marked by Holocaust Memorial Day on 27 January; the 75th anniversary of the end of World War II in Europe – marked by a special Bank Holiday on May 8; then again in August, the 75th anniversaries of the atomic bombing of Hiroshima and Nagasaki and the 75th anniversary of Japan’s surrender. All a long lifetime ago and yet all events which continue to mark our history; events which show both the human capacity for inflicting evil and the human capacity to resist evil.

Both these events also invite us all to examine the roots of violence in our culture today and, especially, in our own hearts. They call us to conversion, to a rejection of the logic of violence and to a commitment to rebuild what has been broken in ways which lead to peace.
