Well we did it! Or more accurately, YOU did it!


The target was £1,000 and we squeaked past it with £1,060 raised in total. The good news is that all the prizes were donated, so that's £1,060.00 straight into parish funds.

A big welcome to all our parishioners and visitors, and to 2019. We trust our parish to the protection of Mary the mother of God.

I wish to thank all our parishioners for the many cards, gifts and generous Christmas collection. For all our priests, this is a tangible way to thank each one of us and forms a major part of our annual income. Thank you all so much for your support over the past year. I also wish to thank the school for the support given me and our parish over the past year.

This year will be a big year for our parish as we celebrate our 60 year anniversary later in the year. Our Pastoral Committee is already working on this event.

We have just celebrated some great Christmas feasts; the solemnities of the Holy Family; Mary the Mother of God; and Epiphany. With today's feast we will celebrate the Baptism of the Lord, and the beginning of commemorating Jesus' adulthood.

Today is a great feast. Here the Holy Trinity manifests itself for the first time. The Father speaks from heaven, the Son is present, and the Holy Spirit descends. At Jesus' baptism, the skies open – imagery frequently used implying heavenly secrets. Through baptism we become members of the Body of Christ. Through baptism we are incorporated into the death and resurrection of Christ. Through baptism, we are adopted as children of God, having the Spirit dwelt within us. We must be open to the Spirit and remain faithful to our calling.

Finally, I wish to thank everyone who helped to prepare our church for Christmas and for all who attended our Christmas Masses.

A Message From Our Bishop "With all my heart, I urge any survivor of abuse to speak out."

On the weekend that Archbishop Oscar Romero was made a saint, in company with Pope Paul VI and others, Bishop Alan's pastoral letter to the parishes highlighted the example both men showed and how it speaks to us today

Bishop Alan wrote: despite threats, Archbishop Romero, who was assassinated in 1980, had become an outspoken voice for the poor in defence of truth and justice. His witness is a model for each of us, and in a particular way for bishops. As he visited the towns and villages of El Salvador, and saw the violence against the people, Romero said "the ones who have a voice must speak for those who are voiceless". How true this is for children and vulnerable adults, yet in recent months we have been shocked and saddened by the example of bishops who have covered up the truth and therefore allowed injustice to flourish. We have heard stories of survivors of sexual abuse whose most basic rights have been violated by Catholic clergy or other members of the church. The lives of survivors have been violated and in some cases destroyed by the crimes of the abusers. Those in authority in the church have often failed to act.

In Brentwood Diocese, the safeguarding of children and vulnerable adults has developed significantly over the last 20 years, and now involves many staff and volunteers at Diocesan and parish level, and in our schools. Our Diocesan safeguarding commission includes representatives from the Metropolitan Police, the legal profession and social workers, together with clergy and lay people who have extensive experience in education and youth ministry.



With all my heart I urge any survivor of abuse to speak out. I know that this can be very difficult, and so I promise, as your bishop, that every allegation of abuse will be met with the response that is both pastoral and professional. I thank our parish safeguarding representatives for the work that they do, and I affirm that safeguarding must be the concern of all of us who are able to give a "voice to the voiceless". It is one of the ways in which, in the words of Pope Paul VI, we "proclaim the gospel by our witness".

Bishop Alan adds that during their recent visit to Rome, the bishops conference decided to commission an independent and comprehensive review of safeguarding structures that currently operate within the Catholic Church of England and Wales. Our children and vulnerable adults must be safe in the Church of Christ. We need to respond to survivors as we heed the words of Pope Francis – no effort must be spared to create a culture able to prevent such situations from happening.

Today's Gospel

Today the season of Christmastide draws to a close. It reaches a wonderful climax in a definitive event in the Lord's life: his baptism in the Jordan. Jesus' baptism was a remarkable event because the baptism offered by John the Baptist was for repentance. The immersion in the waters of the Jordan was a sign of conversion, of a person changing direction in life. John's message was addressed to tax collectors, soldiers and ordinary men and women. It was a message of moral reform, of preparing for the coming of the Messiah. Jesus' baptism is a baptism of solidarity with sinners and began his public life and in this moment, God is revealed as Blessed Trinity.



The Trinity is unique to Christian faith. We are united to

Muslims and Jews because we share a common belief in One God, but at this point our faith departs sharply from these two other faiths because we believe that God is Three Persons in One God - the Holy and Blessed Trinity. God is Father, God is Son and God is Holy Spirit. Jesus' baptism was the manifestation, the epiphany, of Jesus as Messiah of Israel and the Son of God. This unveiling of Jesus' nature and mission brought forth from the Father a tender and heartwarming affirmation: 'You are my Son, whom I love; with you I am well pleased'

Jesus' baptism was the acceptance and inauguration of his mission as God's Suffering Servant. He allowed himself to be numbered among us sinners - he is truly 'the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world!' In today's Gospel we are seeing unfolding before our very eyes the 'fulfilling of all righteousness'. We are witnesses of Jesus consenting to submit himself entirely to his Father's will, which was his death on the cross for the forgiveness of our sins.

The coming down of the Spirit at Jesus' baptism looked forward to the coming down of the Holy Spirit on us - a prelude, if you like, to the new creation. We commit ourselves to entering more deeply into the mystery of our baptism, praying about it, seeking to understand it and growing in our appreciation of this wonderful grace.

Let us be buried with Christ by baptism to rise with him; let us go down with him to be raised with him; and let us rise with him to be glorified with him.' (St Gregory of Nazianzus)


