IN THE GOSPEL TODAY

'Oh, she's the salt of the earth,' we often say when we're referring to someone who's straightforward, honest and without guile. In other words, what you see is what you get. Jesus' description of his disciples as 'the salt of the earth' (v. 13) would've struck a chord. In Jesus' day salt was a valuable commodity. To preserve food from decay salt was applied as a preservative. It also served to enhance the flavour of the food. Furthermore, the ancient tradition of salting the sacrificial offerings (Ezek. 43:24) denoted a purifying function; it was perhaps for this reason that newborn babies were rubbed with salt to indicate the purification of the addition to God's people and as a reminder of the covenant. Those who heard Jesus speak would've understood the meaning and tradition behind the idea of being 'salt of the earth'. In the same way as salt prevents decay and corruption, so too the witness of Christians who live a life in the power of the Holy Spirit protects the world and society from decay and corruption. It also adds much-needed flavour to society.


Too much salt in our food can make us thirsty. St. Augustine once wrote, 'O Heavenly Father, you have put salt in our mouths so that we may thirst for you.' The work of the Holy Spirit is to create within us a thirst for the things of God: for union with him, for communion with him, and for the grace to live a life which is holy and pleasing to him. Jesus also calls us to be 'the light of the world' (v.!4). In this way we're to be like our Master, for in John 8:12 Jesus describes himself as 'the light of the world'. We're called to be countercultural, signs of contradiction, heralds of the Gospel of life in a world which, in so many respects, has lost its way.

'For what can the rays of the sun bestow on me that is comparable to your love? The sun's light is useful in my earthly life, but your love is fashioning a crown for me in the life to come.' (St. John Chrysostom)

Welcome to our parish family and to our visitors to our Sunday celebration.

Last Sunday we heard proclaimed to us Jesus' Sermon on the Beatitudes. Today Jesus uses two metaphors 'salt and light' to remind us of the difference they can make in the world. During Jesus time, as now, salt is used for many purposes. It is commonly known that Roman Soldiers were at certain times paid with salt. At one time salt was valuable to be used as currency in some parts of the world. Jesus uses salt as a

preserving and seasoning. Jesus wants his followers to preserve the society from corruption of sin, and enhance life in the world as pure salt does. He expects his followers to remain righteous and to lead a virtuous life.

Jesus then tells them they are the light of the world. Jesus says 'As long as I am in the world, I am the light of the world'. The time will come when Jesus is not physically present then his followers assume the role of being the light of the world. Jesus wants us to make a difference in our world. We have been called and baptised in his name. He wants us to assume the duties of our Baptism. He wants us to be pure salt and a guiding light in a world that is often in darkness as it is today. Let us give them a taste and glimpse of who Jesus Christ is.

Where there is strife, let us work for reconciliation and peace. Where there is sorrow, let us bring comfort and joy. Where there is hatred, let us offer forgiveness and love. Where there is poverty, let us share our food and things. Let us pray and reflect that being the salt and light in this poor world of sin is to bring reconciliation to God our Father in heaven who in His own time will grant us all favours and blessings.

When we come to Mass let us not be passive but be active, listening to the Word of God and to Jesus in the gospel. Let us pray and, free of sin, look forward with joy and love to receive Jesus in Holy Communion so that strengthened by His presence we can truly be the salt and light to our beautiful world and bring about peace hope faith and love.

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Journey Home Threshold of Hope (Continued)

N BRIEF: THE SACRAMENT OF THE EUCHARIST What is this Sacrament Called?

The inexhaustible richness of this sacrament is expressed in the different names we give it. Each name evokes certain aspects of it. It is called:

Eucharist, because it is an action of thanksgiving to God. The Greek words eucharistein and eulogein recall the Jewish blessings that proclaim – especially during a meal – God's works: creation, redemption, and sanctification.

The Lord's Supper, because of its connection with the supper which the Lord took with his disciples on the eve of his Passion and because it anticipates the wedding feast of the Lamb in the heavenly Jerusalem.

The Breaking of Bread, because Jesus used this rite, part of a Jewish meal, when as master of the table he blessed and distributed the bread, above all at the Last Supper. It is by this action that his disciples will recognize him after his Resurrection, and it is this expression that the first Christians will use to designate their Eucharistic assemblies, by doing so they signified that all who eat the one broken bread, Christ, enter into communion with him and form but one body in him.

The Eucharistic assembly (synaxis), because the Eucharist is celebrated amid the assembly of the faithful, the visible expression of the Church.

The Eucharist – Source and Summit of Ecclesial Life

The Eucharist is "the source and summit of Christian life." "The other sacraments, and indeed all ecclesiastical ministries and works of the apostolate, are bound up with the Eucharist and are oriented toward it. For in the blessed Eucharist is contained the whole spiritual good of the Church, namely Christ himself, our Pasch."

"The Eucharist is the efficacious sign and sublime cause of that communion in the divine life and that unity of the People of God by which the Church is kept in being. It is the culmination both of God's action sanctifying the world in Christ and of the worship men offer to Christ and through him to the Father in the Holy Spirit."

Finally, by the Eucharistic celebration we already unite ourselves with the heavenly liturgy and anticipate eternal life, when God will be all in all. In brief, the Eucharist is the sum and summary of our faith: "Our way of thinking is attuned to the Eucharist in turn confirms our way of thinking."

SYNODAL Pathway Progress

We invite you to reflect on the Synodal Pathway. Pope Francis has extended Synod on Synodality to 2024. He made this decision "in order to have a more relaxed period of discernment". He would like everyone to live it as the journey of brothers and sisters who proclaim the joy of the Gospel.

The first was the worldwide undertaking during which Catholics were encouraged to submit feedback to their local dioceses – these have now gone to Rome. The continental share discussion will be with the Synod of Bishops. The final universal phase will begin at the General Assembly of Synod of Bishops October 2023 to October 2024.

In the meantime, we need to reflect on Eucharistic revival and how we develop and some of reverence and awe in our celebration of the Eucharist and live our Catholic values in today's world.

Ukrainian Emergency Winter Appeal

Ukrainians remain resilient despite the circumstances of the war, but they are in the throes of a harsh winter. For that reason, a new Emergency Winter Appeal was launched to provide food packages for the most vulnerable on the frontlines and in recently liberated regions in East and South Ukraine which is suffering from a severe humanitarian crisis.

The cost of one food parcel, providing enough food for two people for a week costs approximately £16. Each package contains the basics (grains, flour, pasta, meat and fish preserves, oil, canned vegetables, sugar, tea coffee, biscuits, etc.).

It is hoped that £160,000 can be raised allow the supply of 10,000 food parcels to those most in need and I ask that you and your parishioners will consider supporting this Emergency Winter Appeal.
