For a long time, the judge was unwilling, but eventually, he thought, 'While it is true that I neither fear God nor respect any human being, because this widow keeps bothering me I shall deliver a just decision for her lest she finally come and strike me.'

IN TODAY'S GOSPEL

Today's Gospel recounts Jesus' parable about the impatient judge, who was constantly pestered by a woman who wanted an answer to her question. As Jesus tells us, if that judge will answer the woman's need just to get rid of her, will not our heavenly Father answer the prayers we make to him?

Ever since the Age of Enlightenment in the 18th century, people of a philosophical bent have questioned the value of prayer, especially intercessory prayer. For example, it's said that the German poet Goethe never prayed because he argued that the world was set on its course anyway. Of course, God knows what we're going to ask before we do, but the Catechism of the Catholic Church teaches that God '...is the Lord of the universe, whose order he established and which remains wholly subject to him and at his disposal. He is master of history, governing hearts and events in keeping with his will...' (para. 269).

He didn't create the world and then leave it to its own devices! He has assured us that our prayers can change events. So we must keep praying, as Paul says, 'at all times' (Eph. 6:18), when things are both good and bad. Of course, prayer can be frustrating. Sometimes our prayers never seem to be answered. But God may be leading us to discover the virtue of perseverance; in Greek this is known as hupomone, which we might translate as 'stickability'. Christian faith teaches us the virtue of fidelity even in difficult times. We also have help from others in our prayer. Our reading from Exodus today tells the beautiful story of Moses being helped to pray by his brother, Aaron, holding up his arms. The Church has a particular role in encouraging our prayers, by giving us the right prayers to say and by giving us pastors and Christian friends who can help and guide us as we grow in stickability. Don't give up!

'To you, O Lord, I call: my rock, do not refuse to hear me....Hear the voice of my supplication, as I cry to you for help, as I lift up my hands toward your most holy sanctuary.' (Ps. 28:1-2)


Church open each day for visit to Blessed Sacrament

Welcome to our parish family, our visitors and to our new parishioners and their families. I hope that they find us a welcoming community and if you are in the parish hall for refreshments after Mass, please look around to see if there is anyone on their own. Please do not crush on to one table but please spread out and make new friends.

Our children and their parents are preparing for the Sacrament of Confession, the sacrament of our encounter with Jesus himself. Christ's Easter gift of the Holy Spirit is for the

forgiveness of our sins. It is also our divine physician's remedy for the wounds of sin. The Sacrament, celebrated with contrition for sin, binds up the truly brokenhearted and enables us to enter into the new freedom that forgiveness brings. Each time we enter into the celebration of the mystery of the Mass, we are invited, not only to ask for God's forgiveness, but also to offer forgiveness to everyone in our own lives. We celebrate the Eucharist for the glory of God. At Mass we are being changed. Everything in us, which is opposed to being fully alive in the Spirit, is being dealt with. If it is sin, it is being forgiven; if it is a wound of sin, it is being healed. If we come to Mass acknowledging bitterness and unforgiveness and asking God for forgiveness and freedom, we will be set free. The Second Vatican Council reminded us that the Eucharist is at the very centre of our worship of God and our life as the people of God.

Please note that this Sunday 16 October there will be no adoration of the Blessed Sacrament as I am booked at the cathedral to see and pray at the relic of Saint Bernadette.

Please take home our newsletter for reference during the week especially times of the services. I wish you and your families God's blessing and protection this week. God Bless you all.

Journey Home Threshold of Hope

Over the next few weeks we shall be reflecting on Christian Prayer.

In the Old Testament, the revelation of prayer comes between the fall and the restoration of man, that is between God's sorrowful call to his first children: 'Where are you?... What is this that you have done?' and the response of God's only Son on coming into the world: 'Lo, I have come to do your will, O God.' Prayer is bound up with human history, for it is the relationship with God in historical events.

CREATION – SOURCE OF PRAYER

Prayer is lived in the first place beginning with the realities of creation. The first nine chapters of Genesis describe this relationship with God as an offering of the first born of Abel's flock, as the invocation of the divine name at the time of Enosh, and as 'walking with God.' Noah's offering is pleasing to God, who blesses him and through him all creation, because his heart was upright and undivided; Noah, like Enoch before him, 'walks with God.' This kind of prayer is lived by many righteous people in all religions. In his indefectible covenant with every living creature, God has always called people to prayer. But it is above all beginning with our father Abraham that prayer is revealed in the Old Testament.

GOD'S PROMISE AND PRAYER OF FAITH

When God calls him, Abraham goes forth 'as the Lord had told him". Abraham's heart is entirely submissive to the Word and so he obeys. Such attentiveness of the heart, whose decisions are made according to God's will, is essential to prayer, while the words used count only in relation to it. Abraham's prayer is expressed first by deeds: a man of silence, he constructs an altar to the Lord at each stage of his journey. Only later does Abraham's first prayer in words appear: a veiled complaint reminding God of his promises which seem unfulfilled. Thus, one aspect of the drama of prayer appears from the beginning: the test of faith in the fidelity of God.

Month of the Holy Souls

November is a month that we pray for the Holy Souls. In the Narthex there are special envelopes for you to put in the names, with a donation for those Holy Souls whom you wish Mass to be offered up for them during the month of November. They will be placed in front of the altar. 'The commendation of the faithful departed belongs to an age-old tradition of praying for the dead. It's rooted in the early church's faith in God's mercy and faith in a personal resurrection with Jesus. Who indeed assured of their eternal salvation, but after death they undergo purification to achieve the holiness necessary to enter the joy of heaven (CCC 1030).'

Rosary

October is the month of the Rosary. It is a good time for us to be reminded of our call to pray the Rosary every day. This can be traced back to the customer of the Deseit Fathers who prayed all 150 psalms each day. We pray 150 Hail Mary's in the Rosary. Our Lady gave the Rosary to St. Dominic in its present form in the late Middle Ages as an instrument for the conversion of those who had strayed to the errors of the Albigesion rosary. In 1917 in her apparition in Fatima, Our Lady nudged us, through the three Shepherd children, to pray the rosary every day for peace, envision of sinners, in refraction to her Immaculate Heart. May our Lady of the Rosary protect you and yours and lead us all to Heaven.


