

IN TODAY'S GOSPEL

The goal and purpose of the Christian life are to reveal the person of Jesus, in whom the whole of God's eternal design reached fulfilment and perfection. This is exactly the understanding that St. Peter comes to in today's reading. Mere flesh and blood could not have opened his mind to this truth; he could never have figured it out by his natural ability. He received a revelation from God the Father, who opened his mind and his heart to humbly acknowledge Jesus as the Christ.

The word 'Christ' comes from the Greek translation of the Hebrew 'Messiah', which means 'anointed'. In Israel, those consecrated to God for a mission that he gave were anointed in his name. This was the case for kings, priests, and in rare instances, prophets. Through the grace of revelation, St. Peter understood that this was the name and title proper to Jesus. Jesus is the Messiah, the Christ, the Lord's Anointed, and he fulfilled the messianic hope of Israel in his threefold office of priest, prophet, and king.

The Holy Spirit works in us, as he worked in St. Peter, so that we too can proclaim with heartfelt faith 'Jesus Christ is Lord' to the glory of God the Father. The sublime mystery of God made man is at the very heart of the faith which the apostles handed on to us: 'That which was from the beginning, which we have heard, which we have seen with our eyes, which we have looked upon and touched with our hands, concerning the word of life - the life was made manifest, and we saw it, and testify to it, and proclaim to you the eternal life which was with the Father and was made manifest to us - that which we have seen and heard, we proclaim also to you so that you may have fellowship with us, and our fellowship is with the Father and with his Son Jesus Christ' 'Let all the house of Israel, therefore, know assuredly that God has made him both Lord and Christ, this Jesus whom you crucified'.

Today we give a warm welcome to Fr. Joseph (alias Shaun Bailham) who will celebrate our 10.30 a.m. Sunday Mass. Shaun was one of our altar servers for many years. After a time of prayer, and discernment and searching for a career, he responded to the call of God that his vocation in life was to be a priest of the Order of Dominicans. He was ordained in July, and he is known to many of our parishioners. He visited us several times during his preparation. It is a great joy to receive a blessing from a newly ordained priest.

In today's gospel, Jesus says to Peter "get behind me Satan". These words are used for Peter, Jesus' dearest disciple. Why did Jesus use these words? Like any other Jew of his time, Peter waited expectantly for the coming of the Messiah. Different groups had different expectations of what the Messiah would look like. The Pharisees expected the Messiah to be a "New Moses" making the law more stringent, while others wanted him to overthrow the Romans and build a powerful kingdom. However written around 528 BC, when the people were in exile because of their sins, the suffering servant passage brings consolation to the people. As we already know Jesus feeds the hungry, and heals the broken hearted. Peter symbolises you and me. Peter has his doubts and failings but eventually will follow Jesus faithfully.

For us we know only love can bring us satisfaction. The world cannot do that despite the promptings of Satan. Only love can bring us peace. Our world cannot do that. Only love can bring joy. We hunger for so many things but we have to learn the lesson: to love the way God loves. The enemy of love is what Jesus is trying to save Peter from falling into, and that is selfishness, to have everything for ourselves, forcing our point of view on others. Peters words "You are the Christ".

God forgives, He forgives. God loves, He loves. God cares, He cares. Jesus tells us to learn how to love and not count the cost. To love is to serve. We come to church every Sunday even during the week. We pray. We come to adore Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament. All that is important for us. But when we go out into our world, we have to learn how to love, how to care for others. As Mother Teresa said "you will find God in the kitchen". In other words, all you do for others is an act of love and service. The lesson is simple. God loves the world, we have to love the world. God loves you, you have to love God. That we do by serving others, carrying other people's burdens. We have to be givers in this life. Let us ask our Blessed mother to teach us the lesson of love by our quiet actions and words of comfort and above all a good listener.

On the back page of the newsletter you will see a number of QR codes. If you do not give by standing order, or enveloped or online donations, then with your phone, please give through the QR codes. The white bucket at the back of the church is there for those who have neither of the above.

QR Codes

What are they and how do they work?

A QR (Quick Response) code works in the same way as a barcode at the supermarket. It is a machine-scannable image that can instantly be read using a Smartphone camera. Every QR code consists of a number of black squares and dots which represent certain pieces of information. In our instance, the QR code will take you directly to a website where you can make your donation digitally, instead of using cash. The Diocese is wanting ALL churches to use this form of giving to replace cash which is time consuming and expensive to count and check. Using the QR code enables the parish to save time and money – both of which are very welcome!

So please don't forget that if you normally donate cash weekly, then please use the QR codes which can be found on the back page of the newsletter each week. This helps to keep the money coming in while reducing the amount of cash that we have to count, double check and then take to the bank. And amazingly some banks have actually stopped taking cash! **Thank you and God Bless**.

For many years Eddie O'Donoghue has been keeping our financial records, budgeting and doing the parish returns at the end of the financial year. He is shortly moving away from our parish.
