IN TODAY'S GOSPEL

Light plays an important part in Christian liturgy. Especially memorable is the ceremony of light at the Easter Vigil, now just three weeks away. But we light candles at most liturgical services, a sign to us of the presence of the risen Christ, the light of the world. The early Church referred to baptism as "enlightenment" or "illumination" and the candidates for baptism as "those being enlightened". The story of the cure of the man born blind and his subsequent progress from physical sight to the insight of faith is a picture of what happens to the baptized person. John writes of the physical cure in such a way that it reflects and calls to mind the cure of spiritual blindness granted to those who wash sacramentally in the pool that is truly Jesus, the "sent one".



There is a rich vein of irony in this story. We can see how God turns the world's expectations on their head. The reality of things is precisely the opposite of what it seems to be. Those who are so sure they can see are, in truth, blind. He who starts out blind takes a risk at Jesus' invitation and ends up seeing. He passes from blindness to sight to insight. The blind man contrasts with the neighbours, who remain in ignorance; his parents, who refuse to take a risk; and the authorities and Pharisees, who refuse to believe what their eyes see. No one is so blind as the person who refuses to see.

Jesus affirms that he is the light of the world, and the giving of sight to the blind man is a sign of this. There is both revelation and judgement. The coming of the light brings illumination to those who will accept it, and brings to light the darkness in the lives of those who are obstinate in unbelief.

How is Jesus the light of the world? He opens minds to understand and scatters the darkness of ignorance. This he does by showing us God, revealing the divine purpose and the divine will in his teaching and deeds. He went through the darkness of his Passion and death and rose to the glory of eternal light. He makes us sharers in his light-giving and life-giving work. We are called to be enlightened by Jesus and to become a light to others.

Lord Jesus, may your light shine ever more radiantly amidst the darkness of the world.

Bishop Asks Parishes to Prepare for "Dowry Of Mary" Rededication

Bishop Alan has written to parishes across the Diocese ahead of the rededication of England as the "Dowry of Mary" on 29 March 2020, encouraging them to pray the Angelus after parish Masses as preparation for the event. England has been known as the "Dowry of Mary" for up to 1,000 years, going back to the time of St. Edward the Confessor (1042-1066), in whose reign the replica of the Holy House of Nazareth (where the Annunciation took place) was built at Walsingham. On the Feast of Corpus Christi, 1381, King Richard II dedicated England to Mary as "her dowry". He went on pilgrimage to Walsingham two years later. So for 1,000 years, Walsingham has been the great shrine of prayer and pilgrimage for the people of this country in honour of Our Lady. Says Bishop Alan: "On 29 March England will be rededicated as the 'Dowry of Mary'. This will happen in Westminster Cathedral, in Walsingham, in every Catholic Cathedral, in every parish and in as many homes as possible. Mgr. John Armitage, the Rector of the National Shrine of Our Lady at Walsingham, has asked people to prepare spiritually for the rededication by praying the Angelus every day after our parish Masses. The Angelus is a most suitable prayer to prepare us spiritually for the rededication, recalling, as it does, "some essential moments in the History of Salvation, reminding us of Mary's 'yes' to the Angel Gabriel, which undid Eve's 'no' in the Garden of Eden". We profess our faith in "The Word, who was made flesh, and dwelt amongst us", and in his Death and Resurrection, the eternal destiny to which each of us is called in Christ. "I hope that many parishes will respond to Mgr. Armitage's invitation to pray this beautiful prayer after our daily Masses, so that our hearts may be spiritually prepared for the rededication of England as the 'Dowry of Mary'. Mary, Our Lady, welcomed the coming of Christ into the world and into our lives. She will help us to do the same".

However it is still under review and should we have to cancel Masses then we are looking into live streaming the Sunday Mass. However the cost may prove to be prohibitive.

Those using the kitchens in the parish hall/parish room please make sure it is left clean and all tables are cleaned.

Also the Bishops have suggested not to use Holy Water in the church for the time being.

Welcome to children's corner.

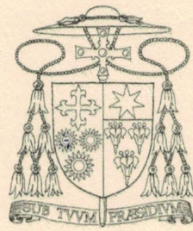

Dear Jesus, help us to be like you and to notice when someone needs help. Help us to see the world and other people like you do, through the eyes of love. *Amen.*



**DECREE AUTHORISING THE GRANT OF A PLENARY INDULGENCE ON THE
OCCASION OF THE RE-DEDICATION OF ENGLAND TO
THE MOST BLESSED VIRGIN MARY ON 29TH MARCH, 2020**

In accordance with Canon 995 §1 and the Indulgentiarum Doctrina (Norms 7-10), as Bishop Brentwood, I grant a Plenary Indulgence to all Catholics within the Diocese of Brentwood who, beside the exclusion of all attachment to sin, even venial sin, on the **29th March, 2020**, use the prescribed prayers for the Re-Dedication of England to the Most Blessed Virgin Mary, and who within a week prior or a week following this Act of Re-Dedication make their sacramental confession, Eucharistic communion, and pray for the Holy Father's intentions (Our Father, Hail Mary, Glory be).


The Act of Re-Dedication should take place publicly, within the celebration of the Holy Eucharist, but in keeping with canon law, it may also take place privately; and, within the Diocese of Brentwood, for those who reside in places where they cannot go to confession or communion at all or can do so only with great hardship, they may gain a plenary indulgence without actual confession and communion, provided they have inner contrition and the resolution to go to these sacraments as soon as possible.
