

MERRY CHRISTMAS

IN TODAY'S GOSPEL

A betrothal in Jewish society in first-century Palestine was an expression of the solemn intention and commitment of the betrothed to marry and was taken very seriously by the couple, the extended family and wider society. Betrothal vows and the sanctity of marriage were bedrocks of Jewish life and culture. Joseph's discovery of Mary's pregnancy would've been a devastating blow for him as a devout Jew because he knew he couldn't now take Mary as his wife. The Torah had very clear guidelines, rules and regulations about not proceeding in a marriage where sexual purity had been compromised, abused or violated (see Dent. 22:23-27). We will never know what went through Joseph's mind at this time but we can reasonably assume there was a fair degree of turmoil and upset. He could have been tempted by the rational explanation that his beloved Mary had either been seduced or even raped, but he is described as a 'just man', so he could have sensed a divine mystery in Mary that he felt unworthy to be a part of. He didn't wish to subject Mary to the shameful trial of a woman suspected of adultery (Num. 5:11-31) but took upon himself the responsibility for administrating as expediently as possible the divorce in order to minimize the obvious distress and hurt. Divorce proceedings in Israel at this time were carried out not in a law court but on the initiative of the male (see Dent. 24:1). Joseph was intent on divorcing Mary quietly (see Matt. 1:19). but after considering and weighing up his options, God intervened in a dramatic and miraculous way.

Joseph's 'Yes' to God and his embrace and acceptance of God's plan of salvation were as crucial as Mary's acceptance and embrace. All believers for all time will be forever grateful to him. This great saint revealed in that one significant moment that bedrock quality needed to live life in the power of the Holy Spirit: obedience.

Many centuries later St. Benedict would give the following invitation to all those who chose to embrace his Rule: 'Put aside your own will so as to go to war under Christ the Lord, the real King, picking up the keen and glittering weapons of obedience.'

Journey Home Threshold of Hope (Continued)

IN BRIEF: "PRAYER IS THE RAISING OF ONE'S HEART TO GOD OR THE REQUESTING OF GOOD THINGS FROM GOD".

THE SACRAMENTS OF SALVATION Celebrated worthily in faith, the sacraments confer the grace that they signify. They are efficacious because in them Christ himself is at work: it is he who baptizes, he who acts in his sacraments in order to communicate the grace that each sacrament signifies. The Father always hears the prayer of his Son's Church which, in the epiclesis of each sacrament, expresses her faith in the power of the Spirit. As fire transforms into itself everything it touches, so the Holy Spirit transforms into the divine life whatever is subjected to his power. This is the meaning of the Church's affirmation that the sacraments act ex opera operato (literally: 'by the very fact of the action's being performed'), i.e. by virtue of the saving work of Christ, accomplished once for all. It follows that 'the sacrament is not wrought by the righteousness of either the celebrant or the recipient, but by the power of God'. From the moment that a sacrament is celebrated in accordance with the intention of the church, the power of Christ and his Spirit acts in and through it, independently of the personal holiness of the minister. Nevertheless, the fruits of the sacraments also depend on the disposition of the one who receives them.
